It's hard to believe that we're almost at the end of the year already, and that 2025 is just around the corner.

It has been a memorable first year for us as a Council, and a lot has been achieved since we were sworn in in

First and foremost has been the tireless – and ongoing – advocacy we have undertaken in preparation for the eventual closure of the Mount Isa Mines copper-mining and copper-processing facilities in mid-2025.

From this, Council has developed the Mount Isa Economic Diversification and Transformation Strategy, which identifies about 60 economic-



diversification projects, programs, and initiatives that can secure Mount Isa's future following the copper mine

About half of the projects have been identified as immediate priorities, including a new copper and critical-

minerals smelter, new sulphuric acid production facilities, renewable energy projects, decarbonisation initiatives, and new transport and infrastructure projects. We are using the strategy to not only attract new industry to the community, but to lobby the State and Federal governments to provide financial support to help the projects become a reality.

Later in the year, Council signed two very exciting Memoranda of Understanding – one with the Flying Whales, and the other with renewableenergy startup Green Gravity.

The Flying Whales are looking to establish their first ever Australian

airship freight base here in Mount Isa, with their helium-filled blimps capable of transporting large and heavy items, such as mining components, across the country. Green Gravity, meanwhile, are looking to repurpose disused mine shafts to generate renewable electricity. These are both promising projects, and I look forward to seeing their progression.

On behalf of us all at Council, I hope you all have a safe, peaceful and wonderful Christmas and New Year break. And don't forget, Glencore is holding its free Christmas Under the Stars community event on December 14 from 6pm at Buchanan Park.



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## **fellow-lid** Recycling

Yellow-lid recycling wheelie bins have been delivered to Mount Isa and Camooweal residential properties over the past two weeks, with the fortnightly collection of the new bins starting from Monday,

The red-lid general-waste bins will be collected weekly, instead of twice-weekly, from that date.

Each yellow-lid bin comes with a starting kit, featuring a calendar, a flyer, and other materials to let residents know what can and can't be disposed of in their yellow-lid bin.

The main items that should go into your recycling bin include hard plastics (soft plastics - the kind that can be scrunched up in your hand – should go into general waste); metals (aluminium foil, containers, and cans, including empty aerosol cans; and steel food tins); glass bottles and jars; and paper and cardboard. The introduction of a recycling service coincides with Council's new Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) beginning operations.

The MRF - part of the Waste Management Facility - will process recyclable materials collected from the yellow-lid bins.

Implementing recycling in Mount Isa offers significant advantages, including the reduction of Queensland Waste Levy costs, which will lead to substantial financial savings for the community in the coming years.

Additionally, recycling helps to extend the lifespan of the local landfill, reducing the environmental impact and need for costly



## Career Professionals Start Post-grad Training


