The economy of the whole North West Minerals Province has reached a tipping point, and if appropriate investment is not made, our economy will collapse.

When Council first began our "six pillars" work when the underground copper mine closure was announced, CopperString was an assumption. Proponents felt confident that it would be the long-term power solution to ease energy prices to make their projects



financially viable. Let's hope that this is still the case and the change in project order will not delay electrification by decades. It is good news, however, that the project is still a priority and that the Queensland Investment Corporation have become involved, to control costs and get private investment for parts of the project. Glencore has released their Social Transition Plan. It was positive to see Green Gravity and tailings reprocessing and re-purposing noted as potential activities that could create jobs in the future. It is also fabulous to see that the Australian Critical Minerals Industrial Precinct is listed as a project to commence.

It was interesting to hear from Steve Minnikin, the Minister for Customer Services and Open Data. He refers to Service NSW, a one-stop shop for all NSW Government services. It is his ambition to implement this in Queensland, which makes great sense. Putting a project management office lens over the whole of government will hopefully find efficiency and streamline the user experience for all of us that deal with government on a regular basis. At a Council level, we have been working towards integrating our systems. We acknowledge that our feedback processes need to be improved when jobs are closed out or scheduled.

Websites Promote Region's Strengths

Mount Isa City Council has joined 10 other Local Governments in the region to launch the North West Queensland Liveability and Jobs Platform.

This project is a first-of-its-kind project for North West Queensland and creates two interconnected websites: Live North West (www.livenorthwestqueensland.com.au) – a dedicated resource showcasing regional liveability, including education, healthcare, lifestyle opportunities and local services; and Jobs North West (www.

jobsnorthwestqueensland.com.au) – a comprehensive employment portal that links job seekers with industry and also features a business directory to support local enterprises.

The project was launched in Brisbane on Tuesday, April 2, with North West Queensland Mayors – including Mount Isa Mayor Peta MacRae – joining the Deputy Premier and Minister for State Development, Infrastructure and Planning, Jarrod Bleijie.

With guidance from key partner the North West Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils (NWQROC), the platforms were developed by Regional Development Australia Townsville, and North West Queensland, with funding from the Queensland Government.

Cr MacRae said the project is a major step in promoting our region as a prime destination to live and work.

"Mount Isa is a place of opportunity. These websites make it easier for people to see the career, lifestyle, and investment potential waiting for them here," Cr MacRae said.

All 11 councils across the region – Mount Isa City, Burke Shire, Carpentaria Shire, Cloncurry Shire, Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire, Etheridge Shire, Flinders Shire, Mornington Shire, McKinlay Shire, Richmond Shire, and Croydon Shire – each contributed to the project, helping shape the content to reflect their individual communities' unique strengths and opportunities.

Deputy Premier Bleijie said the initiative was a



strong example of government backing for regional growth.

"These platforms are more than just websites – they are a gateway to new opportunities," Deputy Premier Bleijie said.

"They provide a comprehensive snapshot of what North West Queensland has to offer, helping connect people with jobs, lifestyle and investment opportunities.

"The Queensland Government is committed to strengthening our regions, and this is a great example of that commitment in action."

Wayde Chiesa, CEO of RDA Townsville and North West Queensland, said the digital tools mark a milestone in the way the region is promoted to the rest of the country.

"This is a bold step to unlock the region's full potential," Mr Chiesa said.

"We're making it easier for people to picture their

future in North West Queensland, whether that's a career move, business investment, or a lifestyle change.

"It's about building a sustainable workforce and helping our communities grow."

New Megafauna Sign on the Barkly Highway

Have you seen this recently installed sign on the Barkly Highway?

It features two ancient megafauna from the Riversleigh World Heritage

- **Dromornis**, or the "thunder bird", which lived about 26 million years ago and could weigh up to 250kg; and
- **Diprotodon**, the ancient ancestor of the wombat which lived about 2 million years ago and is thought to be the largest marsupial to have ever walked the Earth.

It can be found on the Barkly
Highway, about 11km north of Mount
Isa on the way to Camooweal, and
aims to capture the attention of
travellers arriving from the Northern
Territory and the World Heritage-listed
Riversleigh Fossil site, one of the most
significant fossil deposits in the world.

The sign's creation was thanks to a collaboration between Outback At Isa and local TAFE students.

Outback at Isa provided materials, measurements, and designs to the students, who were responsible for



tracing, cutting, and welding the metal signs.

A second sign, set to be installed soon between Mount Isa and Cloncurry, will depict the Thylacine, showcasing its distinctive stripes and gaping jaw.

Outback at Isa tour guide and Riversleigh fossil enthusiast Alan Rackham said 80 percent of tourists did not know the Mount Isa area had fossils until they visited Outback at Isa.

"This new sign is beautiful, and it's got to help. We are hoping that someone or an organisation can sponsor more of these signs," Mr Rackham said.

Council a Presenting Partner of 2025 Mount Isa Mines Rodeo

"I think the board is very well made up of locally connected people and has a healthy cross-section, and I have every confidence that it's going to be a huge success," Cr Ballard said.

Councillor Travis Crowther said the Mount Isa Mines Rodeo's new board had brought the event back to the community.



"I think they're going to bring a lot more tourism back into the city, which then has a flow-on effect for all of the businesses, so it'll be well worth it down the track," Cr Crowther said.

The Mount Isa Rodeo has been running since 1959, originally by local Rotary clubs and later by Isa Rodeo Ltd, which went into administration in late 2024
